A bit of background... Why are we here today?!

- ► The power of conversations (#plotting)
- ► A particular 'moment' for Scotland:
 - > Launch of A Cultural Strategy for Scotland in 2020
 - A growing critical mass of relevant expertise in Scotland - but scattered
 - A marked difference in the tone of the conversation openness to Europe and beyond
 - A unique opportunity for Scotland to claim a leadership role in cultural policy and creative industries research

What is this network for?

- ► To raise the profile and visibility of cultural policy research in Scotland
- ► To offer network members opportunities to connect, collaborate and be prepare to seize opportunities when they arise
- ► Facilitate international partnerships and exchanges
- ► To enhance the research-policy-practice nexus
- ▶ To ensure that Scotland benefits from the remarkable concentration of expertise, networks and influence in this area
- Scotland to be seen as leading cultural policy thinking in the UK and more broadly

How is the Network going to work?

- Four events (Glasgow, Dundee, Aberdeen and TBC), launch and three thematically centred ones over the next 6 months:
 - ▶ 1) The creative sector and post-Covid recovery in Scotland (including the challenges and opportunities for young artists entering the job market) Dundee 19th June
 - ▶ 2) The role of arts and culture to addressing climate change and the commitment to net-zero - Aberdeen
 - ▶ 3) Scotland's international image and role post-Brexit, cultural relations, and cross-national research and policy collaborations, to be co-hosted with Boekmanstichting, format and location TBC
- > The production of a report an agenda for the network
- The development of a governance structure and a funding strategy for the network's sustainability beyond the grant period
