## Conclusions

**Pace of change** - urgency alongside the benefits of genuine engagement, which needs time.

**Policy scale** – align policies and actions at different scales, including SDGs, 4<sup>th</sup> National Planning Framework and local policies. **Rights and responsibilities** - we have recently focused more on human rights in relation to land access in Scotland; we need to consider the rights of nature more.

**Covid-19** –has increased appreciation of local nature/land, but has generated challenges **Collaboration** – Dialogue and shared goals are crucial but structural changes will also be needed. Stakeholder engagement is key to sustainable land use. Art inspires! **Theory and philosophy** – we need uniting theory and philosophy to inform our strategies. A Just Transformation rather than a Just Transition is required.
