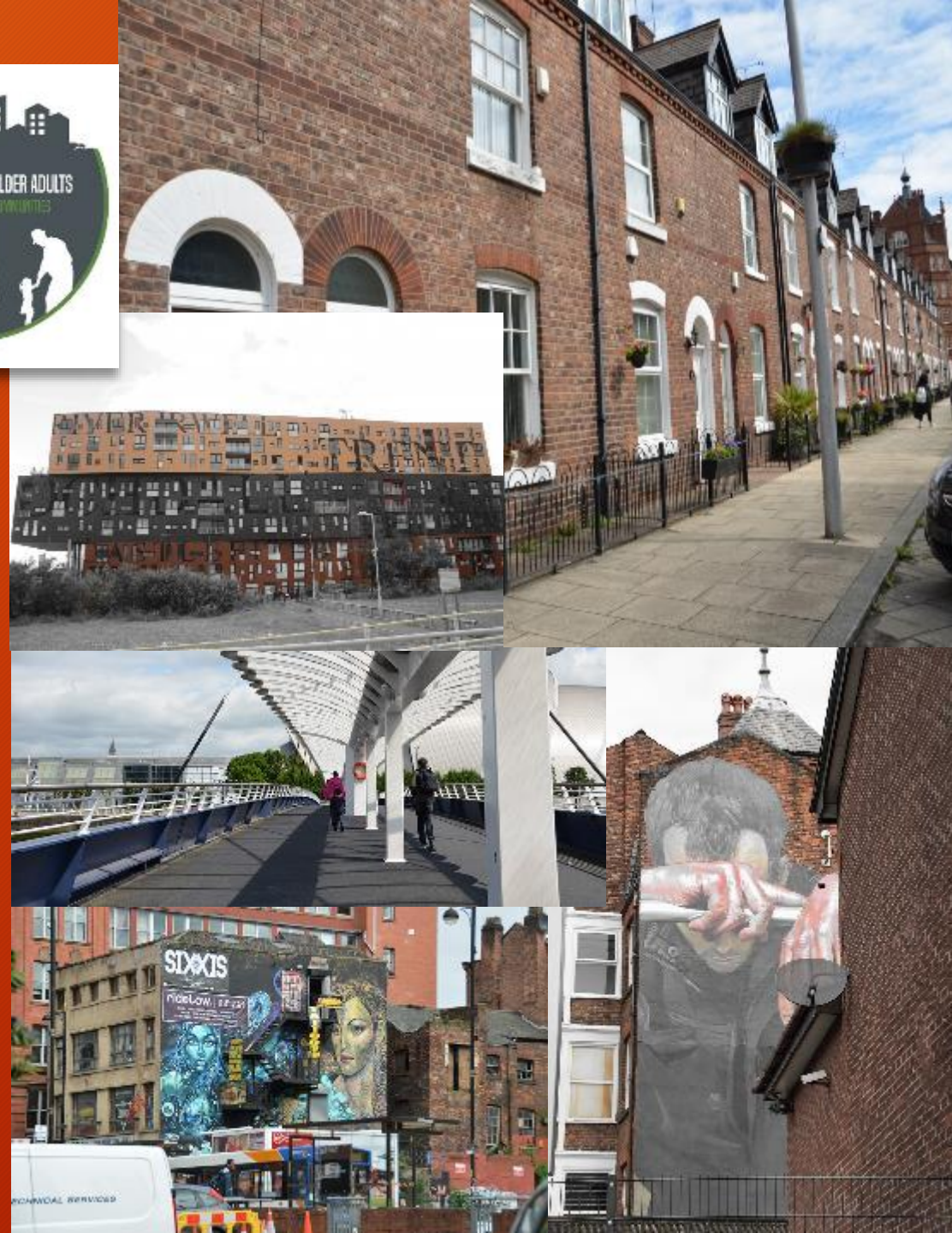

- 10 universities, 6 cities, 18 neighbourhoods across the UK and Brazil. Now expanded to a further 3 cities in India.
- Aim - to capture the experiences of older adults living in diverse urban, social and cultural contexts and translate this into effective policy and practice.
- Understanding experiences: Survey, interviews, photo diaries, walk-abouts.
- Translating experiences into policy: Stage 1-Participatory mapping. Stage 2: Knowledge cafes. Stage 3: Policy workshops
